Commentary The Unexpected

As much as I hate to get on my high horse and make bold platitudinous statements (there's enough of that going around as it is), I have to say that a person should be able to drive through our streets without having trees fall on them. As reported elsewhere in this issue, that is not the case in Poolesville. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured, although the automobile in question doesn't appear all too happy, judging from our photograph. It's bad enough you can get a \$40 speeding ticket in the mail without so much as a by your leave, but at least you get to drive fast before that happens. The victim here did not apparently do anything to call such a calamity upon herself or her car.

I have some experience in these matters. Some years ago, in an era we can call the late 1970s, I was employed for a short while in urban transportation: I was a taxicab driver. This was a great job at the time, and may very well still be, and it was just what I needed at that particular stage of my life. Financially, you could do pretty well, in a cashon-hand sort of way. You may not have made yourself rich, but you always had money in your pocket.

One fine summer afternoon, I was hauling a fare, as we used to say, from the airport and riding up Western Avenue approaching Wisconsin Avenue and Friendship Heights from the south, heading for somewhere tony in Chevy Chase. I looked to my left, to the west, and noted that the sky was really black—Ominously Black. Oh, I

thought, drawing on my incomplete education, it's going to rain soon. We motored along past Wisconsin Avenue when it got really dark, a major wind picked up, and the world, alive with leaves and refuse, began flying past us quite rapidly. Quite suddenly, a large tree fell on us and I came to a quick stop. As I remember, it wasn't even raining yet. It was a big tree, an old tree, but I don't think the entire trunk came down, I think it broke in half, and we were surrounded by branches but unharmed. My passenger, a gentleman from some Scandinavian country with a briefcase and a travel bag, was a little exercised, as I was, and with no thought about power lines or other threats, I got out to look around, discerned that we could drive out of it, and did so. I don't remember much else except my passenger remained unamused and I probably got a lousy tip. I think I also ended up covering the deductible on my scratched-up car, as was the custom when one was hit by an uninsured tree.

It's not much of a story, I grant you, but I learned later that at about the same time, about a mile or so away down Reno Road in the path of the same storm, a woman was killed in her car by a falling tree. I read about the incident in the newspaper the next day, and I do not remember her name, but I haven't driven through a storm since without thinking about her.

I'm not sure what this has to do with Poolesville Day, and I can't think of anything new to say about Poolesville Day, but that woman's untimely death has been on my mind since I heard about the tree across the road and on the car. I also have been thinking about

Rande(m) Thoughts The Thief In the Night



The Morrison Brothers are next in line in a great tradition, and they're bringing new music from their asyet-unreleased new CD, along with favorites that their following comes to expect.

Opening for the Morrison Brothers will be Gina's Soul Party and the Souled Out Horns who will rock their rendition of classic Motown and soul songs. Several of the band members have performed at previous Poolesville Days in a variety of different bands. Four of the eight band members, Rick Blanc (bass), Mike McCarthy (keyboard), Dan Gilbert (trombone), and Gina Beck (vocals), are from Poolesville. The remaining four Jonathan Naugle (guitar, vocals), Tim Holt (drums), Mark Rockman (sax), and Derek Bradgon (trumpet) are also Montgomery County residents.

Doug Bell, that stalwart of Poolesville Days—there's nothing to write, he captured everything so perfectly: "If my math is right, this is my nineteenth Poolesville Day. It's incredibly hard to fathom that we've lived in town all these years. I can't tell you how lucky my wife Kathy and I feel to have raised our family in Poolesville...Poolesville Day closes out my fifth year of 'returning to professional status' in the music business. It's been an amazing experience and has kept me more than busy with what Kathy refers to as 'the world's most complicated hobby.' Poolesville Day 2014 marks my 291st gig since Poolesville Day 2009... As I get older I recognize just how lucky I am to have enjoyed this second shot at performing professionally...I also pause to reflect on my late friend Bill Euler who was a Poolesville Day and Whalen Commons regular over the years, and I think about how much we all miss listening to Bill."

Three years ago, in a quaint village (Poolesville) at the edge of a river, an unassuming group of local blokes won third place at a high school talent show. Since then, Smoke n' Mangos has opened for Grammy-nominated and nationally-touring artists, played the Vans Warped Tour at Merriweather Post Pavilion, recorded three albums, received radio play up and down the East Coast, all while becoming best friends in the process. Band members, Rudy Martin, lead vocals, banjo, Josh Ballard, bass, vocals, Sid Egly, guitar, percussion, vocals, and Corey Thuro, mandolin, vocals, have received rave reviews from local media and have another album in the works. Although they've set their sights on the world (maybe the star-spangled universe), they never forget their roots and their love for their hometown and its special day, so much so that they say, "Poolesville Day is 364 days too short." Aw, so sweet.

Stone Age Rhapsody returns to the Poolesville stage. 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

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Police Blotter: Past and Present

Present Crime

Thefts from vehicle: 17500 and 17600 block of Collier Circle, 19200 block of Walters Avenue, 23000 block of River Road.

Past Crime

September 18, 1952 Police charged a Bethesda man with running a fake termite control service. The man would go door-to-door convincing people that their homes needed to be treated. When he was paid, he would apply some worthless product in the house. Police received numerous complaints about the man before they arrested him. He was found guilty at his trial two weeks later and sentenced to six months in the House of Corrections.

September 19, 1952 Four Montgomery County youths were seriously injured when their speeding car struck a parked automobile on Route 240 two miles north of Gaithersburg. Police said that the car, driven by a seventeen-year-old, was traveling at a high rate of speed when it struck the car. The four were taken by ambulance to the Suburban Hospital with grave injuries.

September 20, 1953 The head waiter at the swank Olney Inn was sentenced to six months in prison as a result of his conviction on a gambling charge. Judge Oscar See said, "It has always been the policy of Montgomery County judges to give heavy sentences in gambling cases. The purpose is to keep gamblers out of the county, and so far we have been successful." Having lectured the defendant, Judge See passed a relatively light sentence of six months.

September 21, 1953 Operation Checkup, a statewide air raid alert, was scheduled to be held on this day. Motorists were going to be required to pull over to the curb and take cover at 2:01 p.m. Police cars and fire engines were to sound their sirens starting at that hour to alert citizens. The Civil Defense Agency announced that at 2:01 p.m., the sirens would sound a warbling type sound for three minutes. At that time, cars were to be turned off, and occupants were asked to crouch or lie down inside their vehicles. Persons who happened to be at home or work were told to stay in their buildings. The three-minute siren was to be followed by a three-minute period of silence followed by a three-minute steady siren at 2:07 p.m. to sound the "all clear."

In reality, the drill was reported to have elicited a "spotty response." In some counties, police stopped traffic and ordered people out of their cars. On busy Route One in College Park, a widespread compliance was reported. On the other hand, reporters waiting in downtown Bethesda reported that they could not hear any sirens and people went on with their business. The director of public safety could not determine why no sirens sounded. In Silver Spring and Rockville, police cars and fire engines drove through the streets sounding their sirens, but their efforts were met with curiosity only.

The state director of civil defense blamed "public apathy" for the poor response but did add that participation in the schools was excellent.

September 24, 1953 Airport officials called the police when they found an abandoned airplane on the runway at the Congressional Airport on Rockville Pike. Officials said that the plane landed at about 10:00 a.m., and the pilot walked quickly away from the plane without making his identity known. Police determined that the plane belonged to a carpenter living in South Hill, Virginia. He was not aware that his plane had been stolen and made plans to be driven to Rockville to pick up his plane. Police had no leads as to the identity of the pilot.

Two-Hundred-Year-Old American Elm Falls to Storm

The heavy storm that dumped an inch and a half of rain in twenty minutes in Poolesville on September 2 produced some of the most dramatically-frightening cloud formations all summer. It also produced a startlinglyfrightening event in the life of Cheryl Thomas, an art teacher at Poolesville Elementary School.

As she left school for the day, she headed out of town on Elgin Road (Route 109) in mid-afternoon when a beautiful old American Elm tree was split apart on the property of 17717 Elgin Road, directly across from Poolesville Elementary School. As one large section fell toward the home, just missing the front porch by just a few feet, the other section fell over power lines toward the Presbyterian Church



onto the street. It also fell on top of the black Chevy compact car driven by Ms. Thomas, crushing the roof but miraculously not causing any serious harm to her. As she made her way back to the elementary school to arrange a ride home from

her brother, a cleanup crew arrived and began to remove the tree from the road. As they worked, heavy rain continued to drench the area.

Tom Evens who lives in the home that was built in 1885 as a rectory for St. Peter's Church, lamented how much he will miss the tree that has shaded the street for an estimated two hundred years. The circumference of the tree was fifteen feet, and a few years ago, an arborist estimated it to be one of the largest American elms in Maryland.

Town of Poolesville Town Government Report

Town Has Light Agenda in First Meeting After Summer

In its first meeting after the summer vacation season, the commissioners considered a limited set of agenda items. With four members in attendance (Commissioner Valaree Dickerson was out of town), there were only two items of any real substance before the commission.

Unity Disposal and Recycling, a contractor for the town, appeared before the commission to discuss recent concerns raised by citizens about service problems. As Unity representative Jerald Boyd, chief operations manager for the firm explained, Town Manager Wade Yost and Town Clerk Bobbi Evans have been discussing the service problems with Unity for a number of weeks. Boyd said the firm wanted to come before the commission to explain what had happened to the quality of service provided to town residents.

Boyd said that the firm had experienced labor unrest beginning in the fall of 2013. He explained that part of the company's employee base had voted to unionize and that had created tension and employee problems. The firm had decided to separate the union and non-union employees and manage them independently. In the process, employees were assigned to the Poolesville routes who were not familiar with the town and its needs. Boyd said this led service levels to decline in the town.

Since talking with the town manager and clerk, Unity has added an additional worker to each truck and beefed up its managerial oversight, Boyd said. The additional workers are not only training to become familiar with the Poolesville routes, they are also adding more hands to ensure better coverage.

Some of the commissioners expressed that the town "took a big leap" in moving the contract from a local firm, Titus Trash, to Unity. They noted that they did so partly due to

cost but also because of the strong assurances made to the town that service quality would be maintained at high levels. There had been concerns, according to some commissioners, about the quality of trash and recycling services in recent years.

Boyd sought to reassure the commissioners that Unity took its commitment to the town seriously and "had more boots on the ground."

In the open forum section of the meeting, Ray Hoewing, representing WUMCO, asked to have some time to speak about efforts the group is making to find a new location for its offices. The organization was founded by Jane Stearns and her late husband decades ago and they have used their home near Barnesville as the base of operations for the organization. He pointed out that WUMCO had provided services of some kind to those in need more than 540 times in 2013. About half of the services were provided within the boundaries of Poolesville, according to Hoewing.

The Stearns home is no longer serving the needs of WUMCO adequately, and the board had been looking for a new office location for a number of months. The group wants to locate its office in Poolesville but has not vet identified a site. They are in discussions with a church which Hoewing declined to name as talks are still in the formative stages. He said that the commissioners have a vested interest in WUMCO's success and that they have contacts and ideas that may help in the search. He asked them to let WUMCO know of any suggestions they might have.

In the Town Manager's Report, Wade Yost explained that with the tough winter weather of the past year and some recent water breaks that required roads to be cut and patched, additional repaying and repair work needed to be done over and above the \$400,000 in paving funds that had been allocated for this year. He said another \$68,000 is needed to repair the Hempstone Avenue-Wootton Avenue intersection, among other things, and said that \$78,000 in funds already allocated for FY 2017 repaying work could be used for the funding without making any budget changes. The commissioners approved Yost's proposal.



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



The Grand Marshall for Poolesville Day 2014 is George Hillard. Mr. Hillard was chosen for this honor in recognition of his many years of service to the community throughout his lifetime. Last year, the Upper Montgomery County Volunteer Fire Department honored him for his more than sixty years of public service as both a volunteer firefighter and as chief.

Hillard was twenty-four years old when the Poolesville fire of 1953 devastated large sections of the town and barely spared his home. As a result of the close call and concern for his neighbors, he resolved to join the local fire department, working in all areas of service, rising through the ranks to become fire chief, a position he held for thirty-nine years.

Unlike today's fire department that is now made up of both professionals and volunteers, in the earlier days, the fire department was entirely voluntary. Unlike today's fire fighters who are equipped with pagers and cellphones, the first responders back in the day were alerted to a fire through the sounding of a large siren in Beallsville and another positioned in the parking lot of Jamison's Real Estate offices. It was George's wife who had the job of sounding the alarm, as George would be out of the house and heading to the fire as soon as the call came in.

His contribution as a volunteer firefighter was even more extraordinary since he was a sole proprietor with his own insurance business. Being willing to take on a voluntary firefighting responsibility is a sacrifice for anyone, but when you own a business, it can be even more challenging. You never know when the call will come, day or night, weekday or weekend. When the call comes, the firefighters go, and business had to wait.

Over the years, George served in an advisory capacity down





PHS Girls' Volleyball: A New Dynamic

A good crowd was on hand, remembering last year's state finalist team, but rooting for this year's squad which has its own identity and its own goals.

Freshman and Senior to Lead Boys' Soccer

At Poolesville's preseason soccer practice, freshman, Christian

Andrade, was pointing to just one game, the first one. "Saturday, September 6 against Einstein," he said. "I don't know much about them. I only know I am starting." Obviously I am looking forward to winning and getting all the way to the top. I am looking forward to the playoffs." Andrade, a highlyrecruited goalkeeper, has been a soccer player since a young age. 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

Plan for Firing Range in Ag Reserve Dropped

Andrew Valois, speaking on behalf of Old Line Arsenal, LLC, made a surprise announcement at the beginning of the last day of scheduled hearings on September 2 before the Frederick County Board of Zoning Appeals: His family decided to drop their plans to go forward with the proposed firing range and training center on Thurston Road.

The 262-acre property in question is near the Sugarloaf/ Stronghold property, and is publicly known as the old Warfield Farm but is owned by Elm Tree Properties, LLC.

The initial public hearings on July 24 resulted in more than five hundred persons signing up to speak before the board with nearly all protesting the plan. The public outpouring was so strong, board members decided to postpone the hearings until August 28. When the hearings resumed, the passion of the protesting speakers continued through more than nine hours of hearings, and, as the second day of hearings began on September 2, Mr. Valois told the Zoning Board that the family decided that the location was wrong for the project. He noted that while many people objected civilly, others were very threatening in their protests. There were no plans announced to move the project to another location.

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


